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DESCRIPTION OF THE BOOK WOVEN SHIBORI

In the traditional shibori technique, stitches are placed into a piece of commercial cloth with a needle, the cloth is compressed, and then dyed. In woven shibori, the "stitches" are supplemental wefts woven directly into the cloth, thus becoming a part of the original cloth construction. The use of the loom to control the placement of these threads has defined a whole new and exciting vocabulary of resist images for weavers, and the integration of cloth construction with surface treatment provides new avenues of expression for textile artists of all skill levels. Woven Shibori has thorough instructions in a range of weaving applications, from plain weave and twills to laces. Through breathtaking photography, clear step-by-step instructions, drafts, and dyeing tutorials, weavers will find the process is easy to work with and marvel at the unlimited possibilities.

CATHARINE ELLIS » WHAT IS WOVEN SHIBORI?

Woven Shibori by Catharine Ellis (Interweave Press, 2005) is a guide for weavers of all skill levels to explore the possibilities of weaving shibori on the loom and creating cloth that only a weaver can make. This is a very comprehensive book covering modern shibori development and technical aspects of woven shibori. The techniques are well explained and beautifully illustrated with close up photos of the fabrics, the weaving drafts presented in a clear way. Dyeing a Woven Shibori Scarf Woven shibori is the perfect medium to explore natural dyes, resists, and layering of colors. One doesn't even have to weave on a loom in order to work with this technique if you are using the woven shibori "blanks" that are woven at The Oriole Mill in Hendersonville, NC and available in the ClothRoads shop. Next month I will be taking a 3 day class in woven shibori with Catharine Ellis. She adapted traditional Japanese shibori into "the language of weaving." The Japanese shibori pattern called mokume is made by stitching parallel lines into a piece of cloth, then gathering the stitches tightly. Ellis brought her cotton shibori fabrics (woven at The Oriole Mill in Hendersonville, NC) to use for our research and experimentation. These cotton fabrics, used in the samples described and pictured in this report, are woven from a high quality pima cotton which provides a beautiful sheen and is

receptive to natural dye extracts. Woven Shibori on a Rigid-Heddle Loom by Elizabeth Lee on May 22, 2009 Shibori is a traditional Japanese technique in which you stitch a cloth with a thread and then pull the thread tight to create a resist, similar to tie-dyeing. Woven shibori is done by weaving with supplementary weft (I use cotton, color-safe embroidery floss) to make the pattern on the loom. Once off the loom, I pull these weft tight and dye. With each experiment I've learned something new. Philip and Annette spent 5 days in the studio working with various woven shibori techniques. Looms were pre-threaded with both warp and weft shibori and different fibre/yarns combinations to explore as wide a range of techniques as possible. Woven Shibori Workshop Our Woven Shibori Workshop was originally scheduled in March and was to be preliminary to our dye day in May where we would dye our woven shibori pieces. But we found that Kathrin Weber was going to be close by so we enjoyed a workshop with her and postponed our shibori workshop until today. Woven Shibori creates a tie-dye effect by weaving in a strong pattern thread that can be used to gather and tie up the fabric (after it is removed from the loom) and create a resist when the fabric is dyed. I got the first scarf off the loom and tied up all of the shibori threads. I had decided to paint the scarf with one color (rust) on one side, wait a bit, and then flip it over and paint the scarf with a different color on the other side.

Loom controlled shibori or woven shibori resist achieves a resist by the insertion of a supplementary or extra thread during the weaving process at the same time that the fabric is being woven. adaptation of the stitched pattern thread method. Instead of stitching the pattern after the fabric is woven, the pattern threads are woven into the fabric as a supplementary weft while the fabric is woven.
